She was first appointed to fill the vacant Ward 1 City Council position in 2012 and was elected 3 times. Stephana was an active member of the Euclid Democratic Club, served in multiple leadership roles including President, and on Precinct Committee and Executive Committee of the Cuyahoga County Democratic Party. As a Councilwoman, she was always available to her residents, assisting with issues, coordinating meetings, advocating for improvements Ward 1, promoting our community, and working for justice and democratic values in all that she did.

While on City Council, Councilwoman
Caviness' accomplished much. As Chair of
the Public Safety Committee, she focused on
safety and justice—supporting hiring officers,
obtaining body cameras, upgrading dash
cameras, Flock cameras, purchasing vehicles,
advancing community policing, addressing
outdated laws including marijuana laws, and
leading discussions on improving safety.
Councilwoman Caviness was a strong
advocate for investment and improvements to
the Euclid Avenue corridor and south side of
Euclid leading to a new Splash Park in Indian
Hills, playground improvements,
reconstruction of the Grand Blvd wall, new

businesses, repaving of streets and replacing waterlines and sewers. Councilwoman Caviness was also an advocate for sustainability, environmental justice and conservation – leading to greenspace conservation and the creation of the Green Creek Trail. Most importantly, Councilwoman Caviness was always responsive to Ward 1 residents and their needs. She held regular Ward meetings, neighborhood meetings, coordinated voter drives, COVID vaccine and testing events, arranged rides to polls, food give aways, education and community events.

Her faith was central in her life and she actively supported Faith in the City and faith-based events and activities.

Stephana demonstrated tremendous strength and tenacity, fighting cancer to the end and continuing to serve her constituents and our city. Euclid is definitely a better place due to Councilwoman Stephana Caviness' involvement and hard work. I know we will all miss Stephana's friendship, smile, willingness to help, positive outlook, and commitment to service and justice. Thank you, Councilwoman Caviness, you will be missed-- but not forgotten!

The Overturning of Roe

On June 24, 2022, the US Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade, the landmark 1973 Supreme Court decision that affirmed the constitutional right to abortion. This information was leaked a few weeks earlier. However, its announcement still came as a shock to many.

Rallies, protests, and sits ins quickly started across the country. I have attended multiple events with neighbors and friends. Most people find this overturning just the beginning of the slow erosion of rights that we as Democrats have worked hard to achieve.

The most frightening part of this is that these changes stop safe abortions. Over decades, research has demonstrated that abortion bans most severely impact people in marginalized groups who already struggle to access health care, including abortion. It is another example of the continued pushing down of a marginalized population. Many memes have been circulating that say, *Your Senator's mistress will always be able to afford an abortion*. As frightening as this is, it has also become evident that Republicans have been strategic and organized in working to have this overturned; it took many years, but they continued to work at it. That is one lesson I think we as Democrats can learn from. We need to become more organized and strategic in our work. This took




All cause for concern... but also not the whole picture.

A Democrat is in the White House, and Democrats control both the U.S. Senate and the House (although by too-small margins). Think of all we did to achieve that! We have a great slate of Democratic candidates for offices up and down the Ohio ballot this fall. They're not going to win on their own, though; from now to November, we have to do all we can to see that they win big.

As many of you know, I love history, especially American history. And history always gives me a

reassuring sense of perspective in difficult times like these. For all our many problems today, we've been through far worse. Our country has been through a civil war, two world wars, a depression, innumerable recessions, pandemics and unrest, terrorism and insurrection. Every time we've taken a beating, we've gotten right back up on our feet.

Think back. It was Ohioans who first took



to the skies over Kitty Hawk, and it was an Ohioan, just two-thirds of a century later, who took that one small step at Tranquility Base. Ohioans were on the front lines of the struggles to abolish slavery, to win women the vote, to end unjust wars, to empower labor unions and to secure civil rights for all Americans. As Democrats we take just pride in the accomplishments of FDR, Truman, JFK, LBJ, Carter, Clinton and Obama, among so many others, just as we do for such great Ohioans as Glenn, Metzenbaum, Celeste, Strickland and Brown (and Brown and Turner)! We can draw inspiration from them, and together resolve that our country's, and our state's, best days still lie ahead.

Of course it won't happen on its own. We have some hard work ahead of us, no doubt. We ought to understand that the news may get worse before it gets better – but it can get better, and it starts with each and every one of us.

And while we should spare no effort in electing the best possible candidates to public office at every level of the Buckeye State, we should also remember that the Ohio Constitution wisely contains the means for citizen referenda and initiatives. If we don't like what our legislators in Columbus are doing about criminal justice reform, gun violence and a woman's right to choose – and statewide surveys show that a substantial majority of Ohioans do not – we have it in our power, all of us, to change the Constitution to bring it more in line with our own vision. It won't be easy, but it's certainly possible. Yes, I know, we tried that already with

gerrymandering, but now we have some important lessons learned for next time – perhaps taking the matter out of the hands of those who so clearly ignored the will of the voters, and giving it instead to a bipartisan committee that will draw on expert advice in its mapmaking.

Democracy is a journey, not a destination. Without demonizing our worst political foes, without ever stooping to their level, we as Democrats need to roll up our sleeves and strive, every day and in every way, to realize the Framers' ideal of "a more perfect Union." We need to remind ourselves once more that what unites us is so much more important, so much more enduring, than what divides us.



So look around you. Speak out. Find allies. Build alliances. Recruit another Democrat (or two or three or more!) for the club.

A better America starts right here in Ohio. We can do it, and we have to try. Our country, our state and, yes, our party, deserve nothing less.

County Council Update

County Councilwoman, Sunny Simon

Cuyahoga County received over 2 million dollars of American Rescue Plan Act funding to address loss of income due to the pandemic. The County Council saw the needs of the

communities each of us represent and developed a system to distribute funds to these cities. The City of Euclid has submitted applications for the following:

1. Two sidewalk snowplows to make sure heavily walked areas of the City are clear and walkable during the winter months.

2. Renovations to the Euclid Animal Shelter, the shelter provides a safe haven for stray animals.



The shelter is in need of a new roof and outdoor fencing for the dogs waiting to be adopted or to be returned to their homes.

- 3. Heritage Park Home Improvement Grant for residents in the Heritage Park neighborhood to repair their homes, this grant will help residents and preserve housing stock.
- 4. Hero Park Playground and Trail. The funds will improve and enhance this neighborhood park.
- 5. Shore Cultural Centre replacement of old and inoperable windows. The Centre is a gathering place for residents and home to small businesses.

These projects will be reviewed and voted upon by County Council in the upcoming weeks. I am optimistic that the applications will be granted because the projects are strong and will enhance the quality of life for Euclid residents.
